The Kolleg-Forschungsgruppe (KFG) 'Universalism and Particularism in European Contemporary History' at Ludwig-Maximilians-Universität München (LMU) is seeking to appoint **three Junior Fellowships (Postdocs)** for the **winter term of 2025 / 2026 (October-March)**. The KFG fellowships are awarded for 3-6 months. The **deadline for applications is 1 December, 2024**. The preferred starting date is 1 October, 2025. The KFG 'Universalism and Particularism' investigates universalist and particularist models of order in European contemporary history from the 1970s to the present.
